Words from the Chair



Dear Friends,

As we near the end of the Easter season we approach three great Solemnities: Pentecost, the Most Blessed Trinity, and Corpus

Christi. These celebrations will help our neophytes appreciate and experience the great mysteries that they were initiated into at Easter. Through the gift of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost, the Church is born, the new law of the Gospel is inscribed on our hearts through the outpouring of the Spirit, we become children of God and partakers of the divine nature so we can now call God 'Abba, Father!' and we are united together in Body of Christ made present for us in the Holy Eucharist.

This edition of Network News includes inspiring stories of the Rite of Election in Brisbane and the Easter Christian Initiations at Wollongong and Adelaide. We also have news about the 31st July National Catholic Men's Gathering, focusing on the Year of St Joseph.

Inside there is information about the upcoming 'Alive in the Spirit' conference on 8-10 July, in which CIAN is partnering with the Pastoral Ministry Network and the Mission Planners Network of Oceania. CIAN decided not to run its own conference last year in preference for this combined conference, which will have at least 5 workshops that focus on the RCIA. You can watch a replay of the official launch of the conference here that will introduce you to this Virtual Conference.

Lastly, I'd like to highlight the announcement that Pope Francis has established the "Lay Ministry of Catechist" in response to the urgent need for evangelisation in the modern world. In his document, *Antiquum miinisterium*, the Pope states that the ministry of Catechist is an ancient one with evidence of 'teachers' of the Christian faith in the New Testament.

This ministry for lay men and women springs from "the missionary commitment proper to every baptised person, a commitment that must however be carried out in a fully 'secular' manner, avoiding any form of clericalisation," says the Pope. Lay catechists will collaborate with the bishop who remains the primary catechist of his diocese, a ministry he shares with his priests. Christian parents are also the first educators of their children in the Christian faith.

This announcement is good news for those involved in RCIA as it officially recognises the role of the lay catechist in the initial proclamation of the gospel and the instruction of catechumens in preparation for the sacraments of Christian initiation. The Vatican will soon publish the Rite of Institution of the lay ministry of Catechist. Dioceses are encouraged to provide suitable formation for catechists.

Rite of Election - Brisbane




The Rite of Election was held on Sunday 21st of February. Over 500 people attended, including 118 Catechumens from 35 parishes, as well as candidates, RCIA teams, sponsors, Godparents and families. It was wonderful to see such enthusiasm, spirit and support for those journeying towards baptism.

The Rite of Election, the second step in the Initiation journey, closes the period of the Catechumen – that is the lengthy period of formation of the catechumen's mind and heart. The Rite of Election is held on the First Sunday of Lent as it marks the beginning of the final and more intense preparation for the sacraments of initiation where the elect are encouraged to follow Christ with greater generosity. The elect, now in the Period of Purification and Enlightenment, are encouraged to use this time for reflection and prayer. It is a time to focus deeply on discernment of self and to listen to the voice that says, "Follow me", all the while being supported by the parish community.

Barry's Long Road to Connect With Faith

It's been a long and sometimes bumpy ride as he has navigated his faith journey, but now at the age of 82, Barry Horwood says there is a "sense of comfort" as he prepares to become a Catholic.

The octogenarian was the oldest of the catechumens affirmed by Adelaide Archbishop Patrick O'Regan at the Rite of Election ceremony this year. The 27 men and women were initiated with the sacraments of Baptism, Confirmation and first Communion at the Easter Vigil on April 3, 2021.

Reflecting on his desire to learn more about the Catholic faith in his twilight years, Barry said it was underpinned by wanting to understand his late mother's

connection to the Church. She died when Barry was only 18 months old and after learning his mum and grandmother were Catholic, there had always been a nagging need to "fill in the gaps".

"At this time in life you become a bit pensive about what it's all about and so that was the notion, that sense of not having had a real connection with one's mother," he said.

"It was a thing I wanted to understand more, to have a better sense of who she was and what her influence on my life was in that short time, and what it might have been had certain facts been different.

"Maybe if things weren't as they were I could have seen myself having the complete Catholic experience, from baptism, to a Catholic education and the whole thing."

While he was not baptised as a baby, Barry grew up attending the Methodist Church and later married in the Church of England.

In more recent years he had more time to think about his faith, the Catholic Church and his mother.

"It's about understanding the values that she was brought up with. It brings a sense of comfort, it's completing a section of the journey...it's filling a bit in.

"That faith journey – we are all somewhere along the track. It adds a dimension to your life that you hadn't possibly had."

Barry said his friendship with Fr Maurice Shinnick over the past 25 years had resulted in many discussions about the Catholic faith and the ideas shared were considered as he eventually came to the decision to sign up for the Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults (RCIA) process.

"This learning process I am on is reinforcing values and it is all part of understanding the significance of bits and pieces," he said.

"As the Archbishop told us, becoming a Catholic is just opening the door, this is not the end. Now is the opportunity for this to be expanded and to learn more and get as involved as you want to be."

Supporting Barry in the RCIA process has been Mary Camilleri from the Emmaus parish. She described it as a privilege to accompany Barry, "a questioner and deep thinker", and fellow catechumens Paul Saler and Adrian Graziano on their journey.

"They have a deep spiritual yearning and their questions both challenge and excite me, awakening anew my own faith each time we meet," she said.

"Being involved in the RCIA program in a number of parishes over the last 35 years has been a phenomenal experience.

"I am always surprised and delighted by catechumens' inquiry stories and the courage it takes to commence the RCIA journey."


